3. <u>Self-Regulatory Organization's Statement of the Purpose of, and Statutory Basis</u> for, the Proposed Rule Change

#### a. <u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this filing is to extend the effectiveness of the Exchange's current rule applicable to Clearly Erroneous Executions. Portions of Rule 11890, explained in further detail below, are currently operating as a pilot program set to expire on April 8, 2014.<sup>4</sup> The Exchange proposes to extend the pilot program to coincide with the pilot period for the Plan to Address Extraordinary Market Volatility Pursuant to Rule 608 of Regulation NMS under the Act (the "Limit Up-Limit Down Plan" or the "Plan"), including any extensions to the pilot period for the Plan.<sup>5</sup>

On September 10, 2010, the Commission approved, for a pilot period, a proposed rule change to Rule 11890 to provide for uniform treatment: (1) of clearly erroneous execution reviews in multi-stock events involving twenty or more securities; and (2) in the event transactions occur that result in the issuance of an individual stock trading pause by the primary listing market and subsequent transactions that occur before the trading pause is in effect on the Exchange.<sup>6</sup> The Exchange also adopted additional changes to Rule 11890 that reduced the ability of the Exchange to deviate from the

Based on the foregoing, the Exchange believes the benefits to market participants from the more objective clearly erroneous executions rule should continue on a pilot basis to coincide with the operation of the Limit Up-Limit Down Plan.

The Exchange does not believe that the proposed rule change implicates any competitive issues. #### 11890. Clearly Erroneous Transactions

The provisions of paragraphs (a)(2)(C), (c)(1), (b)(i), and (b)(ii) of this Rule, as amended on September 10, 2010, and the provisions of paragraph (g), shall be in effect during a pilot period [set to end on April 8, 2014]to coincide with the pilot period for the Limit Up-Limit Down Plan, including any extensions to the pilot period for the Plan.
